By that time Grandpa was living on the home farm where we all lived -

Grandfather Tlachac (your father & mine) boarded boat at Bremenhaven on Oct 30, 1856 sailed 48 days <sup>moved into harbor</sup> N.Y. on 49th day. - Stayed in N.Y. 2 days, then traveled by rail to Milw - the end of railroad - then by stage coach to Cooperstown, Wis. He applied for Citizen papers on Nov 1, 1856. He had dark brown hair, blue eyes - Medium build -

Grandmother Mary Hadst Tlachac sailed from Bremenhaven on Oct 29, 1859 - Arrived in N.Y. after 7 weeks in the middle of Dec. - Boarded train to Chicago. Then transferred to a train for Milw; then traveled by stage coach to Cooperstown arriving a few days before Christmas <sup>in</sup> 1859. She was short - dark hair and grey eyes -

There was no mention of Uncle Meth but - I assume that a small child traveled under a parent's pass port.
